



Daniel Mar Fairfax C. H. Va. Dec. 18<sup>th</sup> 1862.

Dear Sister -

I will write you to night tho' is is only a day or two since I wrote, but I have rec'd a letter from you just now & I can answer a letter much better if I do it just after reading it. When I last wrote you we were doing picket duty near Manassas. We went down there last Saturday & came back yesterday (Wednesday) While then half the Regt went on picket at a time, so you see we had to go on every other day. We (the Command officers) only had to go on once in 3 days, consequently I was only on once while there. You enquire what I have to do while on picket. I will explain as well as possible. It depends upon the nature of the ground & the nearness of the enemy how pickets are posted. Ours have generally been ~~two~~ on a post & from 5 to 10 rods apart; some other Brigades meets the right & left of our line so they extend in that way sometimes for miles. Our Brigade while at Camp Brinker had a line of 8 miles, at Bull Run a line about half as long. If then are 300 men go out at once they will be divided in 3 reliefs of 100 men each. Now a Lieut will take 50
