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promote the strength, beauty, power, and potential of women. Is this so horrible? I see them as very positive beliefs. It's certainly not my whole focus in life, but only a facet of my personality. Where did you get the idea that I'm a "slave" to this ideology??

When you say "this sexist women's lib stuff", I wonder if you have applied what other people have written and said, to me. Or have you made assumptions in your own mind that don't even apply to me. It's as if I said to you "what's with this God stuff?" It creates a fog rather than a clarification; doesn't get down to critical issues. What do you think about the ERA? About a woman's right to choose abortion? About day care needs of working mothers? About rape prosecution? About credit laws for divorced/widowed women? About supporting girl athletics?...These are some things that concern me. I do believe that women have been exceptionally and deliberately degraded down through the ages, that's why there is so much inequality now, and the resistance to changes.

I know I'm not free from being sexist - I'm working on it. It's a rare person in this society who is not sexist - it's almost a part of our culture.

As to "what's going on back there?" The usual. I work, help keep house, dream of the future, enjoy my hobbies and a wide variety of entertainment. Have a lot of good times, have some bad times about my job. I'm having a basically ordinary life thankful for having so much, and offering

few complaints. This is the real me. I'm proud of the way I've taken care of myself, of developing a beautiful relationship with Mary, of all that I've learned and accomplished so far. You are still my father, and I want you to accept me as I am. I hope you can. I hope you will.

The only change I may need is a change of jobs - of career maybe, or place. Don't need or want any change in my lifestyle. It's just great for me as it is - anything else would be intolerable. I have all that I dreamed of years ago, and even more.

I hope you won't become too frustrated about my not leaping in a religious experience. Just don't feel the need or desire for it. I do appreciate your sending the reading material, but I haven't read any since Pat Boone's book. There are so many things that I really want to read, that I just don't take the time and effort to read things that don't appeal to me. Since I feel guilty having them, knowing that you might pass them on to someone else, I'll be sending them back with slides and etc.

If you'd be interested in reading anything about some of the ideas I've mentioned, I'd be glad to send books, too. Just as you probably want me to come around to your point of view, I'd like you to come around to mine.

Well, enough for now (maybe more than enough). I hope this letter hasn't hit you too hard. It definitely seems time to be open and honest.
