which concerned a statute that covered all people - heterosexual and homosexual, married and nonmarried," Mr. Stoddard said.

But, Mr. Stoddard said, it has been AIDS that has given the homosexual rights movement widespread legitimacy. "Without AIDS, Lambda would not be getting grants from the mainstream foundations."

Lambda brings test cases, publishes a manual for lawyers handling AIDS and a monthly newsletter called *AIDS Update* to keep lawyers and others abreast of a rapidly developing area of law. Lambda works with volunteer lawyers and about 14 other civil liberties and homosexual rights organizations in the country to develop common strategies for addressing the legal

impact of the AIDS epidemic.

Even as the benefit marked the gains made by Lambda and by homosexuals, it was just as evident that some stigmas remain. For instance, newspaper photographers were restricted in the pictures they could take because, according to Jonathan Potter, the organizer of the benefit, some participants feared that if their presence became known, others would assume that they were homosexual.
