In the late winter of '85', members of "Vermonters for Lesbian and Gay Rights," (VLGR), while working for educational and political goals, were stymied by the lack of written information for lesbians and gay men from around the state. A vehicle was needed to help the lesbian/gay community develop a method of sharing what was happening in our political, social and personal lives. Members of VLGR applied for a grant from the Haymarket Foundation of Boston. Lo and behold, we received a start-up grant of two-thousand dollars! Thus came the birth of OITM.

We've seen many changes since our first issue. There have been frustrating times such as delayed printings, haphazard distribution, lack of articles, not enough volunteers, advertising problems, personal conflicts, not enough money, etc., etc. I

think anyone who has been involved with a volunteer newspaper knows the story.

Then there are the good times. Seeing issues being published monthly, successful fundraising after the first year, excellent articles, the joy of working with dedicated individuals, and hearing from people from around rural Vermont telling us how good it is to receive OITM.

I find it exciting that the paper has brought people together from all types of backgrounds. We share our varied skills, as well as stories of our daily lives and we have fun! One of the difficult aspects of the paper has been the coming and going of people. Many long hours have been and continue to be put into publishing <u>OITM</u>. Those that have and those that continue to volunteer are deeply appreciated.

Sometimes I ask myself, why keep doing this? I think the reason can best be found from the "Purpose" on page two of OITM. The purpose of Out in the Mountains is to serve as a voice for lesbians, gay men, and our supporters in Vermont. We wish the newspaper to be a source of information, support, and affirmation for lesbains and gay men. We also see it as a vehicle for celebrating the goodness and diversity of the lesbian and gay community."

I'd like to believe that this paper has in some small way provided a better sense of "community" than before <u>OITM</u> existence. This paper is here for you.

When political people know that we have the means of spreading information across this state, they listen to our concerns and they think carefully about their responses.


Another area where OITM has had an important impact is in breaking down the isolation of lesbians and gay men in this
