following the assassination of Harvey Milk in San Francisco.

With candles shielded from the wind, the crowd moved from the lawn of the church down Church Street, gathering once more in front of City Hall. Onlookers in adjacent restaurants marvelled at the number of men and women proceeding along in peaceful protest.

The message sent to the state that night was clear: The gay, lesbian, and bisexual communities of Vermont will not tolerate violence or harrassment in any form, particularly when it threatens the lives of the members of those communities.

We all send our deepest wishes for the recovery of Roger Macomber and extend our sympathy and compassion to his friends and the members of his family. As Roger was not covered by medical insurance, a trust fund has been established to help pay hospital costs.
