ummer is coming and with it are thoughts of traveling. At least my thoughts are of traveling. I am what is known as the "armchair tourist." Since I can't afford to go anywhere exotic and exciting, I read about those who have, either in hard copy (what used to be referred to as "books") or online. The web offers myriad sites geared to the GLBT traveler, from city guides to tours. The following are just a few of the sites that are sure to whet your appetite for adven-

GLBT@ travel.com

There are two print magazines that cater to the GLBT traveler that have an online presence. Our World is monthly glossy featuring color photography and articles that thoroughly cover destinations around the world for the GLBT traveler. Its web site (http://www.pimps.com/ ourworld/) however is not as comprehensive nor as slick as its sibling in print. Like most web sites for print magazines, the Our World site is mostly an advertisement to snag a few prospective subscribers. It does offer a few reprints of articles about GLBT destinations such as Key West and San Francisco but no photographs, color or oth-

A better site is the one for Out and About (http://www.outandabout.com/), the newsletter for GLBT travelers. It is updated monthly with a "highlights" section spotlighting a specific destination or tour; a "Gay Travel Calendar" listing tours and events around the world; articles that cover everything from car rentals to traveling with HIV and links to GLBT travel sites. Of course, the editors of Out and About would like you to subscribe to the newsletter, but if you can't wait till the next issue comes in the mail, check out this site.

Ferrari Guides, publisher of Inn Places, has a web site called Q-Net (http://www.gnet.com/qnet/htm) that is updated as soon as new travel information is available. A recent visit to the site found information regarding accommodations for that ban of Southern Baptists, the Gay Day at Disney World, being held this year on June 4-7. There is also tour information for the upcoming Gay Games, being held this August at Amsterdam. In addition, there are articles about tours, activities, and accommodations for a number of destinations around the world.

Another GLBT travel guide publisher, Damron, also has a web site (http:// www.damron.com/) but it is nowhere as impressive as Ferrari's. For one thing, it is an online catalog for its line of guides. If you want detailed information about a specific place, you would need to order the guide. It does have an online database which works much like a search engine. Plug in a country, state or city, click on the "search" button and pray you get results. However, the places I plugged in came up nada. I

If your budget can only cover a weekend trip, the popular choice among the GLBT set is Provincetown, or P-Town as it is know among the initiated. There are two helpful web sites to help plan your trip. One, which can be found at http:// www.pinkweb.com/ ptown.nav.html, has a clickable list of businesses that cover everything from accommoda-

tions to veterinarians. "The P-Town Guide" (http:/ /www.ptownguide.com/) features photographs, a ride board, and even a contest to win a week-

However, if even that is beyond what you can afford, perhaps a visit to the Prime Time Travels site (http://www.gayweb.com/105/ptvideo/ html) can help. Prime Time Travels offers videos "with [the] Gay and Lesbian traveler in mind" of different gay meccas such as Montreal, Amsterdam, San Francisco, and Provincetown. Each video features information on the accommodations, restaurants, bars, local events and history. Vicarious travel as provided by Prime Time Travels is certainly better than not travelling at all.

Bechdel releases her latest book

borne ... he began sprouting wings. It was clear to me that getting the wings was painful but ultimately a good thing."

I disappeared for one entire evening into the section of The Indelible Alison Bechdel that features reprints of her calendar art. This is a terrific boon to those whose collection might be incomplete. My favorite of these is a single panel depicting the cast of DTWOF in the 'green room.' Lois complains of gratuitous sex scenes as a very butch Toni offers her apartment as rehearsal space, Mo (sans striped shirt) paints her toe nails, and the ever talented Raffi picks his nose while he plays with a toy machine gun. The artist essentially created alter egos for her alter

The marginal comments here and throughout the book give the feeling that Bechdel is sitting next to you alternately beaming with pride and explaining why something didn't work or how she should have done it differently. The experience is intimate and warm and pleasur-

The final section of the book is a sampling of comments Bechdel has received over the years from her readers. These run the gamut from suggestions for story lines - "More Jewish Dykes!! 'We're here. We're queer. We're not just eating Matzoh!" - to true confessions -"DO YOU HAVE ANY IDEA WHAT IT'S LIKE TO HAVE CRUSH ON A CARTOON CHARAC-TER?!!?'
