

## A Quick Tour of LESBIAN MONTRÉAL

You might not know it walking around Montréal's Gay Village, but this city is teeming with lesbians and lesbian culture. The Gay Village (located on Ste-Catherine Street East. roughly from Amherst to Papineau) is a primarily commercial area full of bars, restaurants, hotels, saunas, cafés and shops. Dykes are of course welcome in the Village, but you may feel drowned in the sea of men. If you want to get a true feel for lesbian Montréal, you'll need to go out of your way a little, but it'll be worth your while.

Your first stop in Montréal (as in any big city, by the way) should be the lesbian and gay bookstore, L'Androgyne (3636 boul. St-Laurent). No need to buy anything -L'Androgyne is a great distribution center for free community papers, and fliers. Pick up Fugues, the free gay and lesbian monthly, for a complete listing of bars, shops, restaurants and activities (mostly in French, but there is an English section aimed at tourists). Check the counter for fliers or ask the staff if there are any other special events going on. Hour and Mirror, Montréal's English-language free weeklies, will also provide you with good listings.

Incidentally, L'Androgyne will be celebrating its 25th anniversary in September. Lots of events are planned, including an evening with cartoonists Alison Bechdel and Eric Orner on Saturday September 12. Call (514) 842-4765 for details.

There's always something going on in Montréal, but the highlights of Montreal's lesbian social calendar are by far Divers/Cité, our Pride, and Image & Nation, the lesbian and gay

If you're feeling bummed out

that you missed our Pride, listen up: it's coming up on August 2! Plenty of time to get down here, and this year's celebration are shaping up to be exceptionally fabulous. One of downtown Montreal's most famous parks, Parc Émilie-Gamelin (formerly Berri Square, right at Berri and Ste-

Catherine) is reserved for Divers/Cité activities from Wednesday the 29th of July to Sunday August 2, the day of the traditional parade. There will be tons of things to do the entire week-end, including

lots of special events and parties for women. Queer Girls, the all-dyke musical extravaganza and party on Friday night featuring singer Geneviève Paris is not to be missed. For a detailed programme, call (514) 285-4011.

Image & Nation, the lesbian and gay film festival, will be held at the end of September. Now in its eleventh year, Image & Nation offers ten



it for Divers/Cité or Image & Nation, don't dismay, we can still find some trouble for you to get into!

Montréal has an excellent selection of bars to choose from.. If you are interested in the true-blue nightclub scene, your best bet is to head to Unity (1400 Montcalm, corner SteFridays one features 80's retro, another soul and rhythm & blues). There is also a stage on the main floor, and often some kind of show will happen at around 1:00 a.m. The crowd is somewhat young and the music very

Saturday nights are good to try some of Montréal's smaller neighborhood pubs. O'Side (4075B St-Denis, corner Rachel) is in the heart of the Plateau where many lesbians make their homes. It's a warm, friendly space (women only, except for Monday nights) with big sunny windows, pool tables, and mellow music. Dietrich, a new pub just up the street (4282 St-Denis) offers a T-dance on Sunday afternoons from 5:00 to 10:00 PM with our favorite honorary-dyke DJ, Bobzilla (from Unity's 80's retro room). Dietrich also has a street level terrace which is ideal for sipping drinks in the sunshine. Men accom-

is mixed. The music is mellow, the atmosphere is more pub-like than club. It's a good place to have a guiet drink before heading to Unity. Mississippi Club (1584 Ste-Catherine East) is another nightclub (in the big Bourbon Complex -I tell you, it's out of control) and a generally safe bet on weekends. Music is very commercial dance (i.e.: dance mixes of the Titanic theme) and everyone just dances their pants off (well, tops, actually, but you get the picture).

It's quite possible -and in fact recommended -that you'll want to do something other than go to bars while in Montréal. Montréal has tons of art galleries, theaters, and music venues and on any given week, there's bound to be something of lesbian interest. At the Museum of Contemporary Art (185 Ste-Catherine West) you'll find
